

ACADEMY ISD GIFTED AND TALENTED NOMINATIONS



Nominations for the district's Gifted and Talented program will be accepted **until Wednesday**, **December 15**, **2021**, for students in Kindergarten-12.

Academy ISD defines the "gifted and talented student" as a child or youth who performs at or shows the potential for performing at a remarkably high level of accomplishment when compared to others of the same age, experience, or environment (TEC 29.121). Gifted and talented students are found in all cultures, socioeconomic groups, geographic locales, and environments.

Teachers, parents, or counselors may nominate students in grade K-11. Students in grades 7 through 11 may nominate themselves or other students. Before a nominated student is screened to determine eligibility, parent permission must be obtained. The screening committee will review and evaluate appropriate data and will determine the final decision for placement options in the GT program.

Nomination forms may be obtained from your school offices or the contact listed below per respective campus. You may either email, call to request a nomination form, or come by the school office to pick one up.
